

# THE SITUATION OF REFUGEES TURKEY



Legal arrangements in the field of asylum in Turkish Law are similar to the provisions of the 1967 Protocol and the 1951 Convention on the Legal Status of Refugees. However, concepts and protection types peculiar to Turkish law have been established for the geographical registration principle that Turkey continues to maintain and the non-refoulement principle stated in Article 33 of the Convention. 6458, which entered into force in 2014, categorized the asylum law under three headings of "International Protection".





In this framework of legal status, more than 3 million foreign benefit from international and temporary protection in Turkey.



- 2,758,409 Syrians under temporary protection, another large group demanding humanitarian and legal protection in Turkey according to UNHCR is 285,025 asylum seekers from mostly Iraq, Afghanistan, Iran, Somalia and other countries.

and children under the age of 18



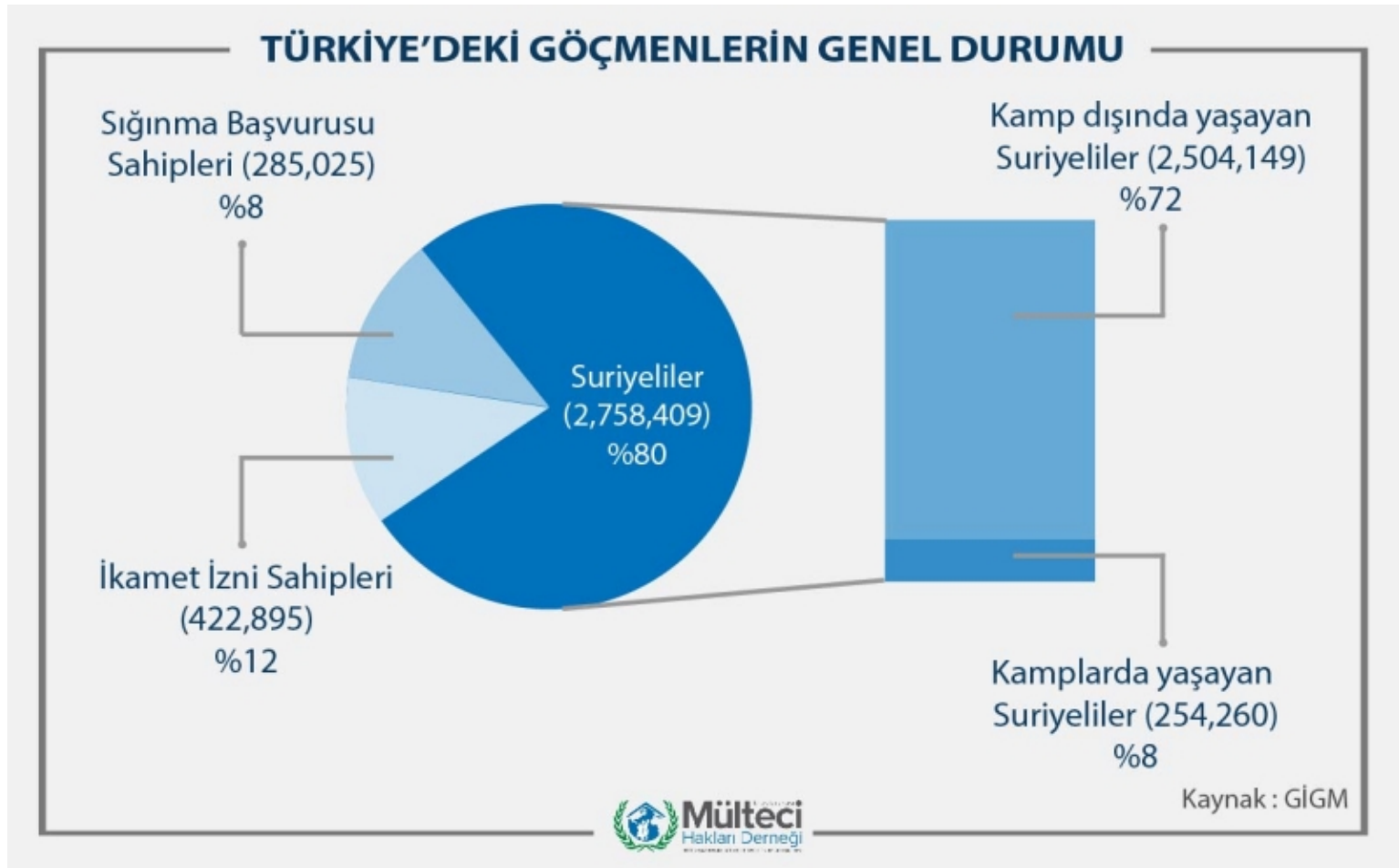
Syrian immigrants can benefit from education and health services as free of charge as Turkish citizens.



For more than 5 years located Syrian refugees in Turkey according to the Ministry of Health were provided treatment 1 million people receiving inpatient in hospital, more than 800 thousand surgery and 177 thousand 568 births was performed. 20 million 252 thousand 984 polyclinic services were provided to the Syrian immigrants.

# Migration Movements of the Bulgarian Turks to Turkey





The experiences of the Bulgarian Turks were a long migration history. Forcing these Turkish people, who once had migrated from Anatolia to Rumelian soil and had lived there for many centuries, to migrate back to their mother soil due to changed conditions, has continued to be a bleeding wound from 19th century to our present time.



The Turks were the largest minority group in Bulgaria and the Bulgarian government saw them as an obstacle to their “creation of one nation” policy and forced approximately 200.000 Turkish citizens to migrate between the years of 1950–1951.
